### Twin, Adoption, and Family Studies

An argument is invalid only if it is not an instance of any valid argument form. The Fallacy of Invalid Reasoning is a formal fallacy. Example: If it's raining, then there are clouds in the sky. It's not raining. Therefore, there are no clouds in the sky. This invalid argument is an instance of Denying the Antecedent.
