A wound care example that has protected many a nurse and organization is the seemingly simple documentation of “wound packing removed/ wound packing inserted.” Measurement and monitoring are essential in demonstrating that specific practices, activities, and expectations that the organization must have in place to comply with quality standards are actually being followed.

Accurate wound assessment and effective wound management requires

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an understanding of the physiology of wound healing, combined with knowledge of the actions of the dressing products available. It is essential that an ongoing process of assessment, clinical decision making, intervention and documentation occurs to facilitate optimal wound healing.

If using photography to chart the progress of a wound, take at least two photographs at each assessment, one about 10cm from the wound and one that shows the position of the wound on the body. Grids By tracing wounds onto an acetate grid and counting the squares, nurses can quickly calculate an accurate surface area.

Describe the Anatomic Location of Wound + Wound location should be documented using the correct anatomical terms. Plantar Aspect . Heel . Dorsal Aspect + Document the cause of the wound: pressure, venous, arterial, neurotrophic, surgical, etc.

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Exudate: Fluid from the wound that can be serous, sanguineous or purulent. Fibrin: A protein involved in the clotting process required in the granulation phase of healing. Fascia: Connective tissue that covers muscle and found throughout the body. Fibroblast: An important cell used in wound healing.
